The Flying Tigers

The Second Sino-Japanese War was a military conflict fought primarily between the Republic of China and the Empire of Japan from 1937 to 1945. This war started two years prior to Germany's invasion of Poland, but it was destined to become part of WWII.

This was the largest Asian war in the 20th century. It accounted for the majority of civilian and military casualties in the Pacific War, with anywhere between 10 and 25 million Chinese civilians and over 4 million Chinese and Japanese military personnel dying from war-related violence, famine, and other causes. The war was the result of a decades-long Japanese imperialist policy aimed at expanding its influence politically and militarily in order to secure access to raw material reserves and other economic resources in the area, particularly food and labor.

Initially the Japanese scored major victories and by the end of 1937 captured the Chinese capital of Nanking. But by 1939, the war had reached a stalemate after Chinese victories in Changsha and Guangxi, and with Japan's lines of communications deep into the Chinese interior territories becoming stretched. The stalemate continued for the next two years. On December 7, 1941, the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, and the following day the United States declared war on Japan.

The 1st American Volunteer Group (AVG) of the Chinese Air Force in 1941–1942, nicknamed the Flying Tigers, saw its first combat on 20 December 1941, 12 days after the Pearl Harbor attack.

Although the group was made up of U.S. service men, the AVG group was officially a branch of the Chinese Air Force.

On 4 July 1942 the AVG was disbanded. It was replaced by the 23rd Fighter Group of the United States Army Air Forces, which was later absorbed into the U.S. Fourteenth Air Force with General Chennault as commander. The shark-faced nose art of the Flying Tigers remains among the most recognizable images of any individual combat aircraft or combat unit of World War II


On the otherside of the drive there is but one scene.
